Ten years ago - in September of 2012 - TIFO's inaugural board of directors signed our organization's bylaws, marking the second-to-last step in our organization's journey to becoming a bonafide 501(c)(3) nonprofit. At that time, we were consumed with efforts to secure funding to remediate Bagega Village in Nigeria, having supported Nigerian partners to remediate seven villages up to that point. The Nigeria project was the impetus for founding a nonprofit organization to enable us to continue working with local leaders and Doctors Without Borders (MSF) to address what is widely regarded as the worst outbreak of lead poisoning in modern history. Nigeria was our first project, and for another two years would be our only project.

We've come a long distance - physically and metaphorically - in the ten years since. 2022 marks the beginning of our fourth project with MSF, this time in Karakalpakstan, Uzbekistan, where the Aral Sea Crisis is causing serious health issues for tens of thousands of residents. Also, in partnership with MSF, we supported spot remediation and environmental health education in mercury mining communities of Batken Province, Kyrgyzstan, where we've been working since 2016.

In between trips to Central Asia, we traveled to Peru to support the Environmental Health Council with assessments of colonial-era mercury mines, participated in the inaugural Earth Gives event, co-lead a federally-funded environmental education project for K-12 Shoshone-Paiute students, and continued to advance environmental health education for undergraduate and graduate university students around the world.
